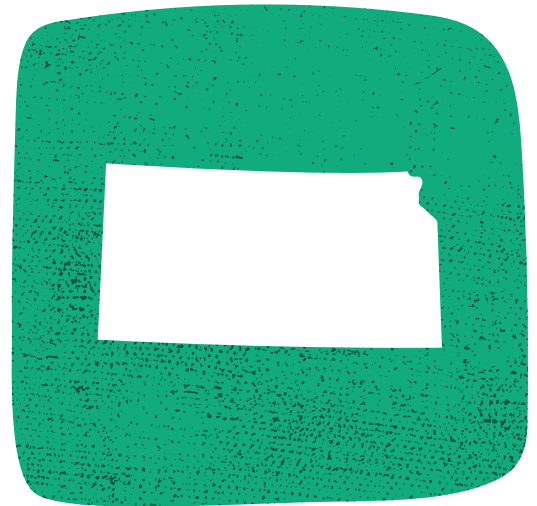


FARMER CO-OPS PROVIDING FOR
